Security personnel will be on duty from midnight to 7:00 a.m. for any late arrivals and in case of emergencies. Please go directly to Boylston Gate in Harvard Yard for assistance between midnight and 7:00 a.m.

The phone in your room on campus will be able to dial oncampus numbers only. Phones in headquarters and House offices should be used for outgoing calls in emergencies only; the lines should be available for incoming calls whenever possible.

A list of classmates attending Reunion is in your registration packet and at headquarters. Cell phone numbers have been included on that list when available.

Headquarters closes at noon on Sunday, May 28, at which time you should be fully checked out of your room, and all personal belongings should be collected. Bellhops will be on hand at headquarters all week to assist you with moving into and out of your rooms. As you leave, please lock your door and drop off your keys and access cards at headquarters.

As a convenience for those checking out on Sunday, there will be reunion van service available to the 10 Everett Street Garage. Ask at headquarters for a bellhop and driver to assist you.

TICKETS AND NAME BADGES

Reunion

The HAA is piloting an electronic check-in and registration process at 2017 Reunions. This program will eliminate the need for paper tickets at non-Commencement day events. Numerous staff members will be on-site to register and check in alumni and

guests at all "ticketed" reunion events. Note that reunion name badges will provide access to the Harvard attractions listed at the end of this program guide.

Commencement

Tickets are required for both Morning Exercises and the Afternoon Program of Commencement and will be available at headquarters on Wednesday and Thursday (May 24 and 25) only. Due to space limitations, only reunion alumni will be issued tickets to the Morning Exercises in Tercentenary Theatre. All persons, bags, and personal items are subject to inspection before entering Harvard Yard. No backpacks of any type will be admitted. No bag or item larger than 12" x 12" x 12" will be permitted inside the Yard. Guests may view the Morning Exercises from the Science Center. Guests are welcome to join alumni for the Afternoon Program. Only members of the Class of 1992 are eligible for Commencement tickets picked up at headquarters during Reunion.

TRANSPORTATION

The influx of family members and guests for Commencement activities makes the campus particularly lively during this time. Mobility in the Yard tends to be constrained. Therefore, attendees are asked to use the reunion shuttle service and bellhops to minimize disruptions to all those enjoying the campus at this busy time.

DISABILITIES AND CERTAIN MEDICAL CONDITIONS

Harvard University encourages persons with disabilities to participate in its programs and activities. Accessible parking for reunion guests is available at the Soldiers Field Park Garage on a first-come, first-served basis. Please utilize the designated accessible spaces and display your state-issued disabled parking placard, if you have one. On Commencement Day, wheelchair runner assistance is provided from the gate to the guest's seat in Tercentenary Theatre. If wheelchair rental is needed during Reunion and you are unable to bring your own, the HAA can provide you with a list of recommended vendors. Additional accessibility-related information can be found at accessibility. barvard.edu. If you have further questions, please call the College Alumni Programs office at 617-496-7001.

MEDICAL SERVICES

Medical services are available at Harvard University Health Services (HUHS) on a fee-for-service basis. Your reunion name badge is your identification for admission to the clinic, which is located in the Smith Campus Center (formerly Holyoke Center), 75 Mount Auburn Street, and can be reached at 617-495-5711. The clinic is open from 8:00 a.m. until 5:00 p.m. each day throughout reunion week. If you are experiencing a life-threatening concern, call 911 (9-911 from a campus phone) or go to the nearest hospital emergency room. For more information about HUHS, visit *huhs.harvard.edu*.

SECURITY

The Harvard University Police Department (HUPD) is an important resource if you are lost, locked out of your building, or in need of help of any kind, and should be the first contact for any on-campus incidents. HUPD can be reached with any of the blue-lit emergency telephones in Harvard buildings and in public areas, or by calling 617-495-1212. If you are staying in University housing, ask your bellhop to point out the nearest emergency telephone when you are escorted to your room. Your registration packet includes a room key for access to your room and an electronic access card for access to the building. You should lock your room at all times.

LOST AND FOUND

If you lose or find something, notify the staff at headquarters as soon as possible. Lost items will be kept at headquarters until Sunday, May 28. After that date, contact the College Alumni Programs office at 617-496-7001. After two weeks, all unclaimed articles will be donated to an appropriate charity.

LIABILITY FOR INJURY OR LOSS

Every reasonable precaution is being taken for your safety. At the same time, no individual or committee can or does assume any liability for injury to any person or for loss of, or damage to, property at any time or place during Reunion. If you have any concerns, please inform the staff at headquarters.

AA MEETINGS

There are many AA meetings taking place during reunion week in Cambridge and the Boston area. Visit *aaboston.org* for locations and times.

GRATUITIES

Students greatly appreciate gratuities for the services they provide throughout reunion week. Gratuities are optional and at your discretion. All tips will be pooled and shared among the students, who work together as a team.

ACCOMMODATIONS

UNIVERSITY HOUSING

University housing is available only to registered reunion participants and is a benefit of attending Reunion. Please bear in mind that Harvard's rooms, although quaint and historic, have relatively modest conveniences. For example, in some cases, bathrooms may be shared.

A hospitality room will be provided for commuters who need a place to rest, freshen up, or change clothes. Inquire at your reunion headquarters.

Sharing a Suite

Typically, a housing unit consists of a suite—two rooms, each with two single beds, sharing a bathroom in the middle. Please keep in mind:

- By reserving Harvard housing, you are electing to stay in the same wonderful dorms and Houses from your time as a student.
- Rooms are not equipped with hotel-like amenities, and most restrooms and shower facilities are shared.
- Most bedrooms are housed within a larger suite. Within your suite, you may be housed with people you do not know, but in most circumstances you will have your own private bedroom.
- You and your registered guests are each entitled to your own beds. Please keep in mind these beds may be in different rooms (within a larger suite).
- Barring extreme circumstances, room changes cannot be accommodated during Reunions.
- Almost all beds on campus are in use during Reunions. If there
 are empty beds in your suite that are not assigned to you, you
 are not permitted to use them or invite others to do so.

LOST KEYS AND MAINTENANCE

If you lose your keys or have a maintenance problem, please go to the building manager's office in your House for assistance. If no one is present in your building manager's office, especially during overnight hours, you may seek assistance at the Boylston Gate of Harvard Yard, which is staffed 24 hours a day. If you are locked out of your room or dorm, you may also contact HUPD at 617-495-1212. Additionally, headquarters staff will be helpful in addressing any problem.

CHILDREN'S PROGRAM

HEADQUARTERS

The main headquarters for the Children's Program is located at Phillips Brooks House, where staff will be on duty daily from 8:00 a.m. (7:00 a.m. on Commencement Day) until midnight. Headquarters for the Evening Program is located in two locations—the Malkin Athletic Center and Hemenway Gymnasium, where staff will be on duty Thursday–Saturday nights from 6:30 p.m.–12:30 a.m. The principal coordinator for the Children's Program is Andrew Vincent, working in partnership with World Sports Camp.

DAY PROGRAM

The Day Program will take place from 6:30 a.m.—6:30 p.m., on Thursday, Friday, and Saturday of reunion weekend. Childcare is not provided on Wednesday or Sunday. A full schedule of Children's Program activities is included in the check-in package. Please check each group's schedule carefully; on Thursday and Friday some groups leave at 8:30 a.m., and it is not possible to rejoin the group until it returns at 5:00 p.m. While the student staff and directors are well trained and experienced, they need your cooperation to ensure that the programs run safely and smoothly. Please inform your child's student staff member or group director if your child will not attend a scheduled activity so that the group does not wait unnecessarily. You may also call headquarters at 617-879-8885 and inform the student on duty.

EVENING PROGRAM

Two Headquarters: Malkin Athletic Center & Hemenway Gymnasium

The Evening Program runs from 6:30 p.m. to 12:30 a.m. There will be two on-campus locations for two different age groups: The MAC gym is the location for children 3–8 years, and the Hemenway Gym is the location for children 9–17 years. 
